

An exclamation ends with an exclamation mark.



Science activity:

Can I explain what a food chain is?

Read the information below alone or with an adult to find out about food chains!

What is a food chain?

Eating food is how we get our energy. Without consuming calories and nutrition, we could not survive.

The food chain shows how living things get their food. Some animals will only feed on plants while others will eat other animals.

Producers and consumers

Plants get their energy from the Sun. They are called **producers** because they make their own food.


Animals are called **consumers** because they eat plants and other animals. They do not make their own food.

Animals that eat other animals are called **predators**. The animals they eat are called **prey**.

Well-being additional activities

Mindfulness activity cards:

Listen carefully with your eyes closed to any sounds you can hear. After one minute, open your eyes and write down everything you heard.



Close your eyes and ask a partner to pass you an object that you can hold in your hands.

Touch and turn the object, describing each aspect in detail to your partner and then swap places.



Ask someone to drop a feather and watch it very closely as it floats to the ground.

Listen carefully to a piece of music and draw a line on a piece of paper which matches the feeling created by the music.



Lie with your back on the floor and place a soft toy on your tummy.

Breathe in and out slowly and deeply and try to concentrate on the way your toy rises and falls with your breathing.
